Ever since I can remember, Laurel Arts has been an integral part of my life. As a child, I helped my mother hang the school art shows, I painted faces at Somerfest, and even parted with my own toys every year to be used in a display for Santa's workshop during First Night celebrations.

As I grew up, I took classes here and attended performances, gallery openings, took part in the Art Seeds program, as well as art camps. Later, I volunteered at those same camps, and eventually taught and coordinated them.

I then worked as a summer intern at Laurel Arts for three years while I was in college. During that time, I did every job imaginable, from administrative tasks to organizing outreach programs, and lots of manual labor! I credit my experiences here with building my resume and preparing me to become an art teacher.

Posters explain history of papercutting

The National Museum of the Guild of American Papercutters at Laurel Arts begins 2022 with a new exhibition featuring educational posters. Five of a series of fourteen posters are displayed at Laurel Arts, and they help explain several multi-cultural traditions of the art form.

Visitors can see the historical origins of papercutting identified in these selections that represent major international styles. Guild members' original

cut paper artworks are also mounted to complement the five posters: Chinese Jian Zhi, Polish Wycinanki, Swiss Scherenschnitte, Silhouette, and Judiac styles.

Although these all have highly distinctive techniques and approaches, easy to learn to identify, the



The art form was popular among both the masses and the wealthy. mainly in France, Britain, and the United States. Though the practice declined after the invention of photography, contemporary artists use silhouette to comment on social issues and explore history.



common characteristics of positive paper parts designed with negative cut away areas are the foundation for creating the shapes and textures of papercuttings. They become "scissor-drawings."

The poster illustrations show significant influences that have blended and inspired cut paper artists for centuries. The art form has evolved and contemporary cut paper artists now often reflect an entirely new, personal, visual language, including three-dimensional forms. Although tools, cultural identities, and social circumstances have been altered by time, the pleasure of cutting paper continues to be translated into expressive art.

Notecards available from *Making Marks* residency

Making Marks, an 18 day-residency sponsored by Southern Alleghenies Museum of Art (SAMA), has culminated with the printing of notecards featuring artworks produced by participants from The Patriot.

Experimenting with textures, lines, and patterns, and using a variety of unusual tools, the finished products allow the viewer to interpret the free expressions in personal ways.

The cards are available for purchase from Laurel Arts, and proceeds will support a 2022 continuation of the program. There are four sets of 10 unique cards available. Mentors from the gallery committee have been privileged to share mark-making techniques with residents of The Patriot, and are pleased that the project verifies Laurel Arts' mission, Arts for Everyone, so beautifully.
